Commemorative Service for the 150th Anniversary of the Rutland Appeal at the Grace Congregational United Church of Christ (U.S.)

On October 9, 1874, the annual conference of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions (a missionary organization) was held at the Grace Congregational United Church of Christ in Rutland, Vermont, U.S. Just before completing his studies in the U.S. and returning to Japan as a missionary, Joseph Hardy Neesima spoke passionately in front of a congregation of about 3,000 people about his determination to establish a Christian school in Japan, and received a pledge of about \$5,000 in donations, which served as the cornerstone for Doshisha.



On Sunday, October 13, 2024, the 150th anniversary of Neesima's appeal at Rutland, an anniversary service was held at the Grace Congregational United Church of Christ.

A total of 27 people from Doshisha University participated, including Dr. Eiji Hatta, Chancellor and Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of The Doshisha, and Professor Katsuhiro Kohara, President of Doshisha University, as well as faculty, staff and alumni of the university.

German Language and Intercultural Studies EU Campus Program 2024 has successfully completed!



From Friday, March 1 to Thursday, August 8, 2024, German Language and Intercultural Studies EU Campus Program 2024 was held at Doshisha EU Campus at Tübingen University. 15 students from Faculty of Letters, Faculty of Law, Faculty of Culture and Information Science, Faculty of Science and Engineering, Faculty of Global and Regional Studies participated in the program.



Right after the program started in March, the students took intensive German courses for Doshisha students including several field trips and an elementary school visit, which contributed greatly for improvement of their German proficiency. From the middle of April, they started to study German language by proficiency level together with UT international students from various countries and regions, and experienced a diverse of intercultural communication. In addition to German language classes, the students deepened their understanding of German and EU society and culture through Joint Seminar-Intercultural

Studies classes with UT students from Department of Japanese Studies and special lectures by Doshisha faculty members on EU Campus.

In extracurricular activities, the Buddy Program was implemented also in 2024, where Doshisha students and UT Japanese Studies students are paired up as a TANDEM partner. While learning each other's language, the students sometimes went beyond the framework of a "Buddy Program" and deepened exchanges on and off campus, either individually or in groups. It is supposed that a part of Buddy students of the Japanese Studies would go study abroad at Doshisha from Spring 2025. Therefore, we are expecting that their friendship would continue and bloom up next year in Kyoto.

Lastly but not at least, we could not realize this program in such a successful way without diligent effort and great contribution by the relevant persons and institutes of UT, especially by "Deutsch als Fremdsprache" and "Department of Japanese Studies." We would like to take this opportunity to express our sincere gratitude for all involved in UT for this wonderful program.

Mr. YAMADA Kai, a student in the Applied Chemistry course, Graduate School of Science and Engineering, has become the first in our graduate school to receive a master's degree diploma from the École Supérieure de Physique et de Chimie Industrielles de la Ville de Paris (ESPCI) through a double degree program.

Mr. Kai Yamada enrolled in the Applied Chemistry course at Graduate School of Science and Engineering, in April 2021 and studied abroad at the École Supérieure de Physique et de Chimie Industrielles de la Ville de Paris (ESPCI) from January 2022 to July 2023 through a double degree program. During his time abroad, he studied "Anormal stability of emulsion" and "Water condensation on oil-infused PDMS gels." After obtaining his master's degree from Doshisha University, he was awarded a diploma from ESPCI in June 2024.

The awarding of a diploma from ESPCI is a significant and first-time achievement for our graduate school.



ESPCI is a member of Paris-Tech, a consortium of the most prestigious French grandes écoles in the Paris region. ESPCI provides an education centered on experimental research, mainly in the fields of physics, chemistry, and biology. It is renowned for producing historical chemists and many Nobel Prize winners.

Professor SERYO Shingo (Faculty of Law) Gives Lecture at the University of Oxford, UK

On Friday, September 20, 2024, Professor Shingo Seryo (Faculty of Law) gave a lecture titled "Recent developments of regulations in digital market in Japan – Comparison with the EU and the UK" at the Faculty of Law, University of Oxford, UK. This was the fourth lecture in the Doshisha Oxford Lecture Series, in which faculty members from Research Center for International Transactions and Law, Doshisha University and the Faculty of Law, University of Oxford, take turns giving lectures at each other's universities.



Professor Seryo's lecture provided an overview of Japan's new digital regulatory law (Act on Promotion of Competition for Specified Smartphone Software), enacted in June 2024, and examined the features of digital market regulation in Japan, while comparing it with EU law and UK law. Local researchers commented that the lecture was very interesting in relation to global trends in digital market regulation and the position of Japanese law within that trend. Held in collaboration with DOMANI,* an educational program for students at our university and the University of Oxford, the lecture was also attended by students participating in DOMANI.

Ultra-Compact Lunar Exploration Vehicle, LEV-2 (SORA-Q), wins award at the 11th Robot Awards (Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology Award) and the Robots and Society Award from the Robotics Society of Japan!

The ultra-compact Lunar Excursion Vehicle 2 (LEV-2) (SORA-Q), jointly developed by Professor Kimitaka Watanabe of Faculty of Life and Medical Sciences, the Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency (JAXA), TOMY Company, Ltd., and Sony Group Corporation, has won the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology Award at the 11th Robot Awards.

This award was given in recognition of not only LEV-2 but also LEV-1, which operated on the moon together with LEV-2.

Together with LEV-1, LEV-2 (SORA-Q) was loaded onto the Smart Lander for Investigating Moon (SLIM) and released from the SLIM on January 20, 2024 and operated on the moon. While LEV-2 took photos of the lunar surface, LEV-1 transmitted the data to Earth. This cooperation between two separate vehicles on the moon, the first time this has been achieved in the world, successfully enabled information about activities on the moon to be transmitted to Earth. In addition, the rovers became the first fully autonomous robots in the world to undertake lunar exploration.

The award recognizes the vehicles' fully autonomous lunar surface activities and LEV-2 (SORA-Q)'s traits as the world's smallest and lightest (mass 228 g) lunar exploration robot, praising the major impact it will have on future space development, and ultimately on the development of science and technology.

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In addition, LEV-2 (SORA-Q) has received the Robots and Society Award (2024) from the Robotics Society of Japan. This award is intended to commend activities and expertise that have contributed (or have the potential to contribute) greatly to the popularization and adoption of robots and to the transformation of society. LEV-2 (SORA-Q) is recognized not only for its successful operation on the moon, but also for its contribution as a toy in making the attractive features of robots widely known.

For the development of LEV-2 (SORA-Q), Sony Group Corporation was responsible for software development, and the person in charge, Mr. Tatsunobu Ando, is a graduate of our university's Faculty of Engineering (currently Faculty of Science and Engineering).

Congratulations to Professor Watanabe, Mr. Ando, and all others involved in the development of LEV-2 (SORA-Q) on your awards!

We are looking forward to your participation.




Report: "Let's experience Kyoyuzen! -Making a handkerchief-" (Presented by SIED)
